Mid-July, and we are now coming into the time of plenty: broad beans are being picked, soon there will be peas, new potatoes can be lifted, fresh lettuce can be nibbled, runner beans are beginning to climb up the poles, gooseberries are ripe for picking – all the things and many more that make allotment gardening a joy (despite the weeding).

REACH FOR THE STARS – 2019 ALLOTMENT COMPETITION

In association with Harrogate Autumn Flower Show, the Harrogate & District Allotment Federation is asking plot holders to plant up a container with an imaginative support, fashioned from anything around the allotment, to create the highest plant or climber possible. Hopefully, some of you will have seen this in the last newsletter and are cultivating a whopper! It should include a container no higher than 40cm – the rest is for plant growth only! The height attained will be a key factor – measurement will be taken from the base of the plant stem. But also taken into consideration will be your resourcefulness in finding a suitable container, in constructing the plant supports and how well it serves its purpose. The winner will receive a pair of tickets to this year's Harrogate Autumn Flower Show! To enter, please submit a photo of your plant in a pot with an 8' cane positioned on top of the pot near the base of the stem. On the back of the photo, give the height of the plant measured from the base of the stem to the top of the plant together with your name and allotment site. Entries should be submitted to Angela Dicken, 74 Otley Road, Harrogate HG2 0DP by **Friday 9th August**. The entries will be judged by Nick Smith, Show Director of the Harrogate Flower Show.

FEEDBACK FROM SITE JUDGING

The results of the site judging will be announced at the HDAF annual show on 18 August.

The judges found many more positives than negatives on the site but commented that standards across the sites continued to rise and there was stiff competition this year. They had visited two outstanding sites before visiting us. They noted the significant improvements made on plots that had been neglected the previous year and felt that the majority of plots were well cultivated and in good condition. They were impressed by the lovely floral displays, particularly on the small site and very pleased that the small site created a favourable impression from the road.

They recommended that plots adjoining the road on the main site grew flowers by the boundary fence, either in pots or in the soil as this would enhance the appearance of the site. They stressed the importance of having a good public image in ensuring the continuance of the site. The contributions of plot holders to the Waste Not, Want Not project was noted and the splendid bug hotel on 57A was remarked on.



TIPS FROM THE JUDGES

1. Think carefully about what you put on your plot and bear in mind what will happen at the end of your tenure. There had been a fashion for planting willow trees on some sites which created problems when the plot was eventually given up and the next tenant wanted the space for growing other things. This also applies to features such as gravel and concrete slabs.

2. Recommended **green manures**: red clover and phacelia. Winter tares are hard to dig in.
3. **Mulches** are good for suppressing weeds. If applying mulch it is best to apply a layer of compost first. Bark chip and wood shaving mulches can leach nitrogen from the ground. Mulches can also stop water getting through to the soil.

GREEN MANURES



Phacelia is a quick growing hardy annual green manure that germinates at low temperatures and is ideal for sowing from March until September. It will grow up to 1m in height and is tolerant of cold temperatures and may over-winter if it's not too cold. It suits most soil types and is attractive to bees.



Winter tares, *vicia sativa*, also known as "Vetches" is a hardy annual that can be sown March - May, or July - September for over-wintering. It is good at nitrogen fixing and for weed suppression on heavier soils but avoid acid or dry soils and dig in before flowering.

Both of these green manures are commonly used on the allotment site.

WATER

It's another dry year, even though it's not as hot as last summer. Most plants need plenty of water, particularly runner beans which are a really good late summer and early autumn vegetable.

If you use a hose, you need to purchase a water licence for £10 from the Allotment Shop. Please make sure the butt is full before you start (watering can users may want to water whilst your hose is connected to the tap), and if you are a watering can user, please make sure to fill up the butt after you have finished.

ANYONE SEEN MY WORMS?

This was the heading of a small article I wrote for the last newsletter. Apparently a few plot holders have commented on the lack of worms.

Sue Firth offers useful advice on "How to Attract Earthworms to Your Garden" If you have no earthworms, or very few, attracting them to your garden can allow you to take advantage of all their benefits. There are multiple types of earthworm ranging from microscopic to several feet in length. The most common found in gardens are night crawlers and field worms, which both thrive in cool soil and can be spotted on the surface of the soil when it's dark, or during a rainstorm when their burrows flood. If you shine a light on them they'll retreat back into the soil. The earthworms typically used for compost bins are branding worms and red worms which don't survive in your ordinary soil – they're used in worm composting boxes and compost piles, and do well provided the pile doesn't get too hot.

To help encourage them to make homes in your soil, add organic matter. If there are few earthworms in your garden it may be because your soil is compacted or low in organic material. You can add chopped leaves, straw, grass clippings, dead roots, semi-decomposed compost, and animal manure which will allow worms to thrive. Earthworms feed on soil and dead or decaying plant remains including straw, leaf litter and dead roots well as animal dung. Dry or wet? Earthworms prefer damp and cool environments, but not too dry, too wet or cold. The thicker the soil canopy, the easier it will be to maintain those desirable conditions.
